

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



DEEP FINESSE EXPLAINED

I am asked many questions about how to bid hands, especially after players have been poring over the hand records. A common theme is: "How should we have bid this game/slam?". This is often prompted by the Deep Finesse program saying that a particular contract can be made.

It's important to know that Deep Finesse doesn't make bidding recommendations. All it does is analyse the play of the hand and the defence - with the benefit of seeing all 4 hands. So just because a contract can be made it doesn't mean it's realistic to bid it in the first place - or to then find the successful play to make. It may be quite fanciful to reach and just be lucky to make or require an anti-percentage line of play which happens to work on this occasion. So players should not be seduced by 'what can make' but develop their own discernment and judgement.

Take the following hand. What contract would you want to reach?

♠ AQJ1075

♥ 9 7♦ 9 5 2

♣ 86

★ 432

♥ A42

♦ A 8 6 4

♣ KJ9

With a flattish 19 points combined, and the possibility of losing as many as 6 tricks, you wouldn't want to reach game.

The auction may unfold like this. East is the dealer and opens a weak no trump, 12-14. South overcalls 2♥. West then competes with 2♠ and North bids 3♥, passed back to West. At this stage it would be reasonable to try 3♠, buying the contract there. On the •K lead from North how would you play?

It looks best to win this (South following with the seven) and take a spade finesse to the queen, winning, (South plays the eight and North the six).


Now a club towards dummy and North plays low. The nine forces South's ace, who now returns the ♥K. After taking the ♥A take another spade finesse (North discarding a diamond), cash the A (heart discard from North) as South's king falls, followed by another club. After North plays low, play the jack, winning. Now the king allows a red suit discard. That gives you ten tricks in the form of 6 spades, two clubs and two aces. Upon checking the hand records you notice Deep Finesse says that 4♠ can indeed

make and the play outlined above is how it could be done. Here's the full deal.



Does that mean you should have bid 4♠? No. Before jumping to that conclusion you should reflect on what made it work. Apart from the spade finesse you needed North to have both the queen and ten of clubs. Is that great odds? No.

Notice too that Deep Finesse would also tell you that 4♠ could make if North had the singleton king of spades. In other words play a spade to the ace. Remember – Deep Finesse can see all four hands. Would that be good play in general? No, playing for singleton-king with 4 cards missing is anti-percentage, even if it works occasionally. If you play that way all day long you'll make less tricks than your opponents most of the time.

So ignore what Deep Finesse says when discussing what you should have bid. You need to be more discerning about how good the contract is, before rushing to say: "We should be in 4...".

The Ubiquitous Lead of the 2 of Diamonds

If you look at the online results of any session which has been scored using Bridgemates and where the opening lead has been recorded, you will notice that the two of diamonds has been led

a disproportionate number of times. Many players tend to be rather careless when entering the opening lead because "it doesn't matter".

Although it is very convenient to press the "2" button and then the "diamond" button, I would like to try to convince you to be more conscientious when entering the opening lead for a number of reasons....

1) A lot of players derive

a level of enjoyment from looking at the results and trying to determine how pairs reached certain contracts and how the contract was made on the opening lead given. This phenomenon is not at all limited to those players who were playing in a given session. In particular, many players new to the game find it very educational to look at hands, contracts and results when they are published on line. It can be a most useful learning tool.

Even if you do not believe that this motivation is worth going to the trouble of

accurately recording the lead, there are reasons where your own results may be impacted if the correct lead is entered.

2) Many scoring programs now have the

capability of checking for anomalous results tered into the Bridgemate unit. The accuracy of the opening lead provides an additional method for the director to judge whether or not a strange score is possible. If you have entered the correct lead, vour chances of the error being picked up brought to your attention during the session are enhanced. Otherwise, when you do discover the error, it may be too late to do anything about it.


Common Bridgemate errors -

- * The wrong declarer is entered and not noticed by either pair in accepting the score. * A gross error in the number of tricks recorded. This classic case happens not infrequently: NS play 4H and make 11 tricks. Not vulnerable, this should score 450. The Bridgemate unit operator however accidentally enters 1 trick rather than 11. That's nine off still 450, but neither side notices that it has been given to EW.
- 3) Occasionally, boards can get fouled during the session. This happens when, at the end of the play of the hand, the

players return the cards to a different pocket from whence they originally came. Or, some cards may get mixed between hands even though all still have 13 cards. Of course, when the board is played at the next table, the players have no idea that there is something wrong. Ideally this should be discovered and rectified as soon as possible. This may be possible if the director is checking the results as they come in. A really bizarre result might be discovered by the error checking mechanism (for instance, NS playing 6NT when it is an EW hand). However, if the contracts are more mundane (eq both sides playing 1NT or other low level contracts), it may be that the only way of identifying a fouled board is because the stated opening lead doesn't make sense.



At a recent event at our club a young champion, Matt Smith, complimented WABC for having the best library on bridge

in Australia. I am delighted to pass on this compliment to all members who have contributed to the libraries' development and success.

Most modern libraries contain large audio visual sections. The growth in this area in at WABC has been led by June Fox, who is responsible for Acquisitions. June has recently purchased over forty DVDs for our library. The DVD lectures are given by favourite bridge authors and teachers such as Bernard Magee, Ron Klinger, Mike Lawrence and Eddie Kantar. Shelved at the beginning of the collection, and covering all aspects of basic bridge, from bidding, play, and defense to various conventions, they are an easy and excellent learning tool. The Library Committee recommends you have a browse, select and borrow a DVD.


You will notice a selection of new books which are now shelved in a special "New Arrivals" section of the main collection. Titles include "The Right Bid at the Right Time", by Neil Kimelman, which to quote David Schokman "helps to improve your bidding judgement and make decisions at the right time in the auction". There are also new titles from Ron Klinger, Larry Cohen, David Bird, and Tina Zines's book of Intermediate Bridge Play Problems.

Members will also find a large collection of journals, shelved in the South wall cupboard. There are loose monthly issues and journals bound into annual or biannual collections most of which may be borrowed by contacting a Library Committee Member, whose names are on a list attached to the main shelves. Better still if you have a spare half hour the articles are short and make excellent browsing or a quick read.

For example, we suggest you have a look at the recently bound edition of Australian Bridge, Vols 44-46, 2013 -2015. It contains dozens of interesting articles by bridge luminaries such as Ron Klinger highlighting the" Best of Tim Seres", Larry Cohen, Paul Lavings, Michael Courtney, Peter Smith in "Bidding Forum" and David Bird's delightful series "Tales from the Monastery at St Titus".

All members are encouraged to use and take advantage of our superb resource. Please come into the Library, have a browse and consider what aspect of your game needs improvement. We have the book or DVD for you.

After winning the opening spade lead with the ace, Seres led the diamond jack and overtook with the queen. He led the heart jack hoping that west would have a singleton spot of some quality. East covered with the queen and South's ace collected the seven.

The diamond ten was led to the ace, and Seres happily noted the appearance of the eight from West. He led the club jack, which won the trick when everyone played low. Another club was taken by the ace and a spade from East forced South to ruff, arriving at this position:

Seres cashed the club king and entered dummy with the useful diamond seven. He led a low trump, forcing East to put up the nine. The king won and a winning diamond was ruffed with the eight of hearts.

East was now defenceless. If he overruffed and led a trump the south hand would make the remaining tricks. He chose to overrruff and lead a club. South ruffed with the six and dummy's heart five was good enough to win the last trick, beating east's three. Score + 650 to North-South


