

#### BEYOND THE BASICS with Peter Smith

## "We Don't Reverse."

I've lost count of how many times I've heard the above statement. My usual response is: "You do reverse whether you know it or not!" Understanding the reverse, though, is another matter. You are East with this hand.

- ♠ A832
- **y** 8
- ♦ Q83
- ♣ J9742

Your partner opens 1♦ and naturally you respond 1♠. Partner rebids 2♥. What would you say now?

West East 1 ↑ 1 ↑ 2 ▼ ?

Partner has shown at least 5-4 shape in diamonds and hearts respectively and is asking for preference. (Note that a 2♥ rebid should never be made with just 4-4 shape since a 4-4-3-2 hand would bid no trumps – either as an opening or a rebid; and with 4-4-4-1 shape including a singleton spade rebid clubs, not hearts.)

Even those who "don't play reverses" (which you must) and think that 2♥ isn't forcing (which it should be) won't avoid auctions like this. However responder would of course hate to pass now – it's not much fun playing in a 4-1 fit! So as you can't stand hearts, you'd better go back to diamonds. But you may be worried about having to go 3♦ rather than being able to stay at the two level. After all, you only have a 7 count and may feel you have no business getting to three.

This is where you need to have some understanding of the reverse - and trust that your partner does too. You must bid 3 to show your obvious preference for

diamonds – with no fear of being too high. Due to partner's sequence this is now simply the cheapest way you can show preference for diamonds - even with just a 6 or 7 count. To cater for this your partner's 2 rebid promises at least 16 high card points.

Here's a typical hand:

- **★** K4
- **♥** K O 7 2
- ♦ A K J 7 2
- **♣** 53

Rebidding 2♥ requires 16+ high card points simply because the bidding may end up at the three level. After partner's weak preference to 3♦ you should now just pass – you've done enough. And how would opener rebid on this hand?

- ▼ K Q 7 2
- ◆ AKJ72
- **♣** 53

Just rebid 2, promising long diamonds (usually 6, but sometimes just 5) and a minimum hand - less than 16 high card points. The worst that happens then is that partner passes – but it sure beats ending up at the three level with insufficient strength.

I've found that people who claim they "don't reverse" would rebid 2♥ on both of the above hands and wonder why they get into bother with the weaker hand.

But How Will We Find Our Heart Fit?
Superficially you may seem to be giving up on a heart contract by rebidding just 2◆ when minimum rather than saying 2▼. But that's not the case. You'll still find your heart contract if it matters. You simply leave it to your partner to introduce the suit over the 2◆ rebid.

#### How Do I Know if I'm Reversing?

A reverse is defined as a rebid at the two level in a new suit that is higher ranking than your first suit. (You will never be reversing if you open 1♠.)

Another way to remember it is to apply this test before rebidding: If I make this rebid can partner return to my first suit at the two level or would I be forcing us to the three level? It's a reverse if you're committing your side to three.

There would be no problem in the above auction if your second suit was clubs.

- ♠ 94
- **y** 53
- ♦ AKJ72
- ♣ KQ72

After a 1♦ opening and 1♠ response a 2♠ rebid always allows an escape at the two level – so promises nothing extra.

#### Quiz

Which of the following auctions are reverses?

Opener has reversed in all except number 5. It's never a reverse if you rebid at the one level. It's also never a reverse if you support responder's suit – a reverse is always a new suit.

Once you understand the principle behind reverses you'll also appreciate that with the rebid promising 16+ high card points it should be forcing. In other words, responder can't pass. That's useful on a hand like this:

- **★** KQ4
- **♥** AQ92
- ♦ AKJ72
- **4** 5

After starting with 1♦ and hearing a 1♠ response, rebid 2♥, forcing. Partner must bid again - perhaps 3♦ as above. With your next bid you can then show your spade support with 3♠. That should then lead to your best game contract. On the responding hand above your partner would have a choice of contracts - either 3NT or perhaps 4♠ on the Moysian (4-3) fit.



## Is Arrow Switching Fair?

All bridge contests are meant to be fair. But a common question, particularly for big one session events such as congresses, is "How fair is it to arrow switch a Mitchell in order to determine one winner?"

Firstly, as I am not a mathematician, I trust the advice of those who are. Among them there is a complete consensus that the concept of arrow switching is fair. To understand a bit about this in a non-technical way it's worth looking at the ideals of a fair movement.

#### The Balance of a Movement

A movement is well balanced and fair when there's a strong overlap between the following 3 elements:

The pairs you actually play against, The pairs who played your cards on each board,

The pairs who played your opposition cards for each board.

lan McKinnon of ASEComputing rates a movement's balance by assigning a 'calibre' – a score out of 100 – to reflect its integrity. Howell movements naturally score well (in the range of 91-100, depending on actual number of tables). However, arrow switched Mitchells also provide a well balanced one-winner movement, with scores from 90 to 98. In contrast, non-switched Mitchells rate in the range of 40 to 52.

The only interesting point that remains then is how many rounds should be switched and when.

### How Many Rounds/Boards Should be Switched?

It's only necessary to arrow switch approximately one-eighth of the boards.

This may seem counter-intuitive to a lay person as superficially it seems 'fairer' that half the rounds should be switched. In fact to switch any more than the recommended number causes imbalances; the calibre decreases, making the movement less fair to all. I won't bother detailing here the mathematics but you can either just trust this (after all, the work of mathematicians underpins the successful operation of many items you rely on in your daily life) or simply look online for proof: Dr Ross Moore of Macquarie University has published a detailed paper on this.

For common movements that you encounter this will equate to switching either just one round when playing a 3 board movement or two rounds if playing a 2 board movement.

### Which Round(s) Should be Switched?

Mostly, this doesn't matter much. It's usually more to do with the director's convenience logistically e.g. fitting in with announcements being made, coffee breaks etc.

When arrow switching just one round, any one will do. If two rounds need to be arrow switched it can be a bit more technical (depending on the exact number of tables) but the scoring software offers appropriate options.

So arrow switching is definitely fair when done correctly. If you play in a big event and find you don't win it's no more reasonable to blame arrow switching than it is to say "We didn't get any cards". It's what you make of the random hands you get that counts.



With the diamond finesse failing and hearts breaking poorly it is a difficult contract.

West led the C10 which Seres won in dummy. He then played three rounds of spades, West discarding a diamond while he ruffed the third round in dummy. Then Seres cashed the ace of diamonds, came back to the ace of clubs and led another spade which he ruffed in dummy after West pitched the queen of clubs. A third round of clubs ruffed low in hand followed by the fifth spade and West could not prevent declarer coming to ten tricks. In the other room North-South played in 3NT going down two.

West defended poorly helping declarer to make the contract. He must ruff the third spade with the 9 or 8 to diminish the power of dummy's trumps.

### My Bridge Career by Jay Medhat

(as narrated to Bernard Yates)

Around the age of fourteen my father taught me the French game of Belote which is similar to bridge. It requires quick decisions, fast playing and is usually played for money. Then, while I was a student, one of our professors announced that he would hold bridge classes. I joined the course and he introduced bridge in an academic way on the bases

mathematics, logics and principal of probabilities against possibilities, etc. The common system was Culbertson which is similar to Standard. We started supervised and graduated to competitive rubber bridge games.

After working for two years I got a scholarship and went to the University of California for further study. Whenever I could make time besides study and other activities. played bridge with the other students.

Back in Tehran I joined a social club which had many Iranian and foreign bridge players as members or visitors and one could always find players for a game of bridge. Once a week some friends and I enjoyed a very social game of bridge - with a bottle of whisky!

A recently established womens' club had bridge evenings two nights a week and invited me to play bridge with the ladies. The standard of bridge suffered but for a mid-twenties bachelor the fascination of glamorous members made the games irresistible.

After almost a year of social bridge I met a competent bridge player with an exceptional gift of a photographic memory and great intelligence. We became regular bridge partners and participated in any bridge competitions that our jobs permitted. Also, I started playing for high stakes. It was this experience that taught me to keep in mind every bid and every

card that had

played.

London and London School of Economics became a focus of my interest. I took one year off from my job and took a course at the L.S.E. I ar-London rived in months before the beginning of the 1962 academic year. I knew a titled **English** couple whom I had played bridge and who had been my guests for sailing on the Caspian Sea. They invited me to their social bridge parties and

through them I met and associated with a wide circle of English high society, spending weekends at their country mansions and listening to the ladies gossip while playing bridge.

An exceptional opportunity came my way when an Iranian friend invited me to play bridge once every fortnight with a former president of Pakistan, an ex British foreign minister and a high ranking home officer which lasted for many months. More than the pleasant games was listening to their discussions on world affairs - and of course the elaborate din-



ners compared to my usual student budget meals of spaghetti or chicken biryani.

After a most exciting and productive year I was called back to Iran to take a very challenging job. I joined up with my old partner and other friends to play bridge.

A few years later, while I was spending a weekend with friends on the coast of the Caspian Sea, I had an unexpected visitor from Savak (the security police force) instructing me to return immediately to Tehran and report to the Defence Minister. In Tehran there were urgent messages including one from the Minister of Industry whom I visited first. He told me that a few weeks previously at a cabinet meeting in the presence of the Shah, His Majesty announced he had a project and wanted him to find a candidate. He went on, "I suggested you and when you were cleared and approved it was arranged that tomorrow at 9 am in the company of the defence minister you are to be introduced to His Majesty." I told him I was not willing to take such an assignment. (Of course I didn't tell him that I didn't agree with the Shah's policies which were against the constitution.) He told me " then better pack your suitcase and leave the country".

This was a new phase of my life as far as bridge was concerned. Gradually I became involved in playing bridge with highest echelons of the country. It was very interesting to see how people in power behave in bridge games.

In the summer of 1967 while I was sailing with my brother I spotted an orange point on the shore that was new to me. After sailing we went for a walk, curious about the orange spot. Three people were sitting near an orange tent. A couple that I knew walked to greet me followed by a stunning blonde. The next time I went sailing, my brother was replaced by my future gorgeous and exceptionally talented wife.

In 1980 we left for Nice. Playing bridge with the French was quite different from playing with Iranians or Anglo-Saxons. It always involved extensive intelligent discussions!

In 1983 we moved to Perth and I joined the Undercroft Bridge Club and started my bridge games next to the beautiful beaches of Perth.
