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Editorial

Summer again! How did that happen.

I guess one of the reasons it snuck up on us is because we did not have a Spring edition. The reasons why we did not

are complex but essentially I think it is because we, your editorial team, are finding it very difficult to source material. Trumps Plus has had many lives, which is not surprising given the Club is over 50 vears old, and has taken many forms. The current style, which was introduced 12 years of so ago, has been based on three streams - club information (photos of winners and grinners primarily), bridge educational and teaching stuff, and club social stuff. The first stream is still reasonably viable, if someone remembers to take the photographs and write up events, but the other two streams are (perhaps reflecting with our current environment) suffering from drought. In particular the educational and teaching stuff we now source primarily from other web sites, and the club social stuff seems to have died away to nothing. No one is interested in writing social notes or sharing their take on emerging bridge systems. As a result we have difficulties in putting material together Parallel to these changes have come changes in media presentation. The "new" Trumps Plus introduced in 2008 (you can see earlier styles, usually in newsletter form in the Library) took advantage of the relatively new PC based publishing. But times move on and paper based media is rapidly shrinking. Our service providers - banks, councils, newspapers and so on – are continually exhorting us to change from paper reporting to electronic reporting. And we are responding, accepting less paper reporting and more and more electronic reporting. That change is also happening in the bridge world, guite rapidly in recent

years, with pretty well all bridge service providers – clubs, state umbrella organisations, private suppliers such as teachers, etc – now disseminating their material primarily electronically.

How does this affect us? Well, we will continue to publish member offerings if they come, so if you would like to tell your fellow members about that challenging set of slams you had recently, or the interesting bridge players you met on your Baltic cruise, we would be very pleased to publish, but Trumps Plus will mainly be based on club reporting. We will also look to see how we can use the web rather than paper, recognising that there are members who have limited access to the web and so still prefer to have a paper form available.

. But, Facebook anyone?

On to other matters, social notes in particular, those members who were members back when the Club started its move from Waratah Avenue to Odern Crescent, i.e. here, will remember Tom Leman, our Architect. Tom extracted the essence from the Club's brief for its new home, put it all together, and converted into the design we all appreciate so much today. I had the great pleasure of meeting up with Tom a while back at the GNOT finals where he and his wife Kit were members of one of Kalamunda Bridge Club's entries. Tom plays bridge at that club and I see from their results that he and his partner won the Club's Men's Championship competition this year. Well done Tom. And our continued thanks for our very enjoyable bridge environment.

Having said all that, let me wish you a happy Christmas (unreconstructed traditionalist that I am) and a prosperous (in the bridge sense, of course) New Year. And because you are bound to have thoughts about what I have said above, please contact me on chris-

President's Report

It is hard to believe that the festive season is once again upon us.

The six month period since the last edition of Trumps Plus has been interesting in that the June to September quarter was relatively quiet with quite a number of members seeking warmth either overseas or further north in our state. Despite this attendance was good and there were some successful events. The Masters of Three as usual was well attended and popular and the new State Masters with Rookies proved so successful that with the amount of positive feedback it has been decided that this event should be held at least twice a year in future. Thanks for this must go to Robin Paterson and Carla Sullivan for their superb effort in organising this event.

A recommendation was made by the Tournament Committee and accepted by the Management Committee that the Restricted Teams Master-point cut-off be increased to 1500 COMBINED master points rather than 300 per payer. If there is a 5 or 6 person team, the alternate player(s) must meet the master point cap of the team, as do any substitutes. This was implemented in the Teams Championships in August. It is anticipated that this will encourage a larger proportion of our members to play in either the Restricted or Open events.

A decision was also made to discontinue Jackpots next year and introduce a new competition in addition to a stratified winner of Player of the Month to be awarded with free game vouchers as the prize. As a result of disappointment expressed by a number of members this decision was reviewed by the Tournament committee and Jackpots will continue but in a revised format.

A demonstration on use of the defibrillator was presented by Helen Alison from the North Cottesloe Surf Club on Saturday 18 August with approximately thirty members in attendance. This proved to be very informative and extremely well received by those attending. It has been suggested that such a demonstration should be repeated on a yearly basis.

Fortunately we have not had any unexpected building maintenance issues during this past six months and the NBN changeover has been completed with some difficulties arising but thanks to Sheenagh's efforts finally in place.

The bad news of which many of you will be aware is that we have been the victim of a serious theft. This occurred in the dark hours of Tuesday night 10th September when 90 metres of three phase cabling was stolen thus disconnecting all power to our building. Thanks again to Sheenagh's amazing response and organisation of electricians etc new cabling was laid and power reinstalled within 48 hours. The cost of this was in the vicinity of \$20,000.00 and fortunately was recouped from our insurance company.

As a result of this the Management Committee is currently considering quotes for extra security measures to be installed to prevent a recurrence of this theft due to the isolation of our building and the absence of passers-by during the periods of darkness. The City of Nedlands has also been approached requesting the installation of a secure meter box, this matter is still under consideration by the Council.

The AGM was conducted on 15th October with no new matters being tabled. The election of Management Committee members revealed little change apart from the resignation of John Aquino and Pauline Kelly, these members being replaced by John Rigg and Gloria Carlson. It was announced that a sub-committee headed by John Nelson was to be formed for the Strategic Planning and Marketing of the Club. This is deemed to be a responsible move for the successful functioning and resulting longevity of our wonderful club.

Of course the Christmas congress held in late November although smaller than our Winter congress was a great success. Sheenagh in her usual style convened the congress with great aplomb and the Directors did a sterling job with no problems requiring the intervention of the Recorders or other officials. Players enjoyed both challenging bridge and that amazing food organised by Kerry Barnes, Robin Paterson and other volunteers.

I must admit that when mentioning "volunteers" it is very disappointing that out of over 1,000 members it is so difficult to find even a few members who are willing to give a small amount of their time to assist in the running of our Club. The burden seems to fall most of the time on just a dependable few and the Management Committee members. Some of us are getting a bit long in the tooth now and a bit worn out so would greatly appreciate seeing a few new and hopefully younger people stepping up. If any of you feel you are able to help in any way please do make a call to any of the Management Committee members. Believe

me, volunteering has its own personal rewards.

On a brighter note, of course you will all have noticed and enjoyed our stunning new table cloths in the playing area. These were all made by our Management Committee Member Kate North. And, would you believe she has also made another full set to alternate with these. Thank you Kate – what a job!

As most of you will be aware our Prize Giving and Christmas party were held on Tuesday 10th December. The prize giving was efficiently conducted by Sheenagh with me doing the easy bit of distributing the prizes. The party following was attended by approximately 200 who seemed to enjoy the food and drinks and the opportunity to fraternise independently of the card playing.

In conclusion, my best wishes to you all for a safe and happy festive season.



MYTH BUSTERS



You will recall that the June edition of the ABF Newsletter, which I am sure you have all

read, had as its front-page article a story about the late, great, Barry Crane, bridge expert and Hollywood producer. In the article the author described one of Crane's invariable rules: when looking for the queen you didn't have to think about it – the queen will be over the jack in the minors and under the jack in the majors. Hmm. No mention of probability? Nope. That was the rule.

I thought at the time I read this that this was odd, but apparently he insisted his partners followed his rule, threw a tanty if they didn't. Hmm, I thought, I've had partners like that.

Anyway, some weeks later I faced the following hand:

Playing North I was declarer in four hearts, with the lead of A. I can see nine tricks, ten if the hearts break. I am missing three queens. For some reason Mr Crane's rule came to me and for one wild moment I thought to follow it but I wilted when I imagined what my partner would say. So I ruffed the club continuation, played the * A&K, got the bad news and played the &K&J, eventually making the long spade for 10 tricks. Later, after the autopsy and refraining from sharing these thoughts with partner who might have questioned my sanity, I wondered what would have happened had I followed Mr Crane's rule. Remember that it says if you hold the Axxx and dummy has the KJxx then if the suit is a major you lead the ace and follow with a low card to the jack. If the suit is a minor then you cross to the king and finesse the jack coming back. So here I have both options available, the major (twice) and the minor. First, let's fix trumps. Following the rule I cross to the spade ace and return the heart ten, finessing the queen which should be in the west hand. Alas. That didn't go well. So try again. If the queen is over the jack in the minors then the missing diamond gueen should be in the east hand. Lead the jack from hand and finesse the queen in the east hand. Once again, alas. And double alas because if I follow the rule for the spades then once again the queen is wrong, or the rule is wrong, but certainly I am wrong because I lose a



club and three queens for one down. Truly, alas-alack. And Barry Crane's rule? Sorry Barry, busted.

Which just goes to show. You shouldn't blindly agree to partner's particular plays just because they are a much better player than you. As for the late Mr Crane, he was bludgeoned and strangled to death in Los Angeles in 1985 and 34 years later a suspect was arrested in North Carolina, one of the recent cold case resolutions enabled by DNA. The story was reported in the August issue of Australian Bridge: you might have noticed it while looking up your results in the Australia-Wide Pairs competition. The complete hand was:



PARTIAL DRAWING AND RULE OF ONE


WITH Andrew Robson

The Rule of One states that when there is just one trump outstanding which is a master, you should normally leave it out. Why waste two of your trumps to get rid of a trump that will win anyway? As declarer, the Rule of One position (one master trump outstanding) is very powerful.



In (a), cash AK then (assuming the suit splits 3-2) leave their master trump outstanding.

In (b), to reach the Rule of One position, duck the first spade. On regaining the lead, cash ♠A and (assuming a 3-2 split) leave their master trump outstanding. Note if you play ♠A and another, they can win and draw a third spade which you don't want.



In (c) and (d), the aim is to ruff the fourth heart in the dummy, necessary unless hearts split 3-3. In (c), duck a spade. On regaining the lead, cash ♠A and, leaving their master trump outstanding, play ♥AKQ and ruff ♥5 with ♠4. Note you do not mind if a top heart is ruffed with their master spade as you can peacefully ruff ♥5. In (d), you must duck a heart first. On regaining the lead, you cash AK to reach the Rule of One position. Then play ♥AK and ruff ♥5 with ♠3. Note if you instead play VAK and lose the third heart, they may lead a fourth heart with their partner ruffing from a doubleton spade --which you don't want.

There may be another way:

Declarer won \checkmark J lead with \checkmark A and ducked \bigstar 3, West winning \bigstar 10 and leading \checkmark 10. Winning \checkmark Q, declarer cashed \bigstar A (both following) to reach the powerful Rule of One position. You may think he should have ducked a diamond earlier but there is an 100 per cent line (on a 3-2 spade split).

Declarer crossed to \clubsuit A and ruffed \clubsuit 2. He crossed to \forall K and ruffed \clubsuit 4. He cashed \blacklozenge A, crossed to \blacklozenge K and ruffed \clubsuit 7.

Ten tricks made!!

Bridge and Diversity



I direct at a small club in Maroubra, in the south-east of Sydney, which is only 10 kilometres from the centre of the city. At a session recently I conducted research on the origins of

the players, which they did not have to participate in to protect privacy, but they were all highly enthusiastic. There were 13 tables hence 52 players and they cheered the results which showed they came from 18 different countries including; one each from Hungary, Sri Lanka, New Zealand, Singapore, Zimbabwe, Lebanon, Italy, Malaysia and the Soviet Union. Two were from the Czech Republic, Indonesia and China with three from Greece and India. The UK came in third with 7, South Africa 8 and Australian born topping the list with only 12 or 23%. One insisted that I also register him as gay. I appreciate that the numbers would be different in some suburbs and certainly in the country, but it demonstrates what an amazing multicultural society Australia has become and how the bridge tribe welcomes a diverse range of people who thoroughly enjoy the friendship and experience.



In a recent copy of the NSWBA newsletter eCongress a reader asked Matthew McManus a question that I thought would be of interest to our readers. It highlights the need to be careful when finalising a hand, and the set of hands for that matter. Here is the question, and Matthew's answer.

The Question:

A problem arose at the bridge table about which I'd like your advice. Contract is 4♥.

Defence cannot remember the close of the match clearly. However, 4♥ by West is given making 10 tricks. This is the first board in a round of 4 boards.

At the close of the round of 4 boards. West informed the opposition that in the first hand played he had a club in dummy and also in his hand at the last trick. South had the Ace of clubs. The play of the Ace Clubs would have led to only 9 tricks making.

Contract defeated.

West claimed that both North and South basically conceded the contract and he folded up his cards and assumed 10 tricks. His argument is that South might not have covered the club lead from dummy with the Ace.

In my view West has not only been unethical but illegal in taking 10 tricks.

Matthew's Answer:

The laws state that a player may not claim any trick that they did not win, nor any trick which they could not possibly win.

From the scenario you presented, it sounded like West had losing clubs in both hands at Trick 13. Therefore the contention that South might not have covered the club from dummy does not make sense... South only had one card left. I think perhaps the director would need to do a bit more investigation to uncover what actually happened.

Just because the opponents concede some or all of the remaining tricks, it does not mean that the other side are entitled to them. If there is no possible way to win a trick, the player is ethically obliged not to accept it.



Slams...

and other unique forms of behaviour

I was reflecting on slams the other day, as one does, bidding and making them, bidding and not making them, and not bidding and making them, and I saw a short review of a new book on the subject in the NSWBA's eCongress News – The Big Payoff – Slam bidding at bridge, by Bill Treble. Here is the review by Paul Lavings:




The author first looks at what it takes to make a slam, examining balanced hand situations, upgrading with a bit of shape or good intermediate cards and degrading with poor shape and lack of intermediates. Then he looks at distributional slams, the power of 5-4, 5-5 and 6-4 trump fits, high cards in partner's suits and fitting shapes. There are many full example hands at the end of each chapter and Treble always discusses the play and defence as well as the bidding.

Peninsula Swiss Pairs -Swimming against the tide

The Peninsula Swiss Pairs, played at the end of July, was a 7-round event that was convincingly won by Mark Kolodziejczyk -Les Grewcock on the remarkable total of 114.46 VPs. They thus averaged 16.35 VPs per round, despite one small loss! Daylight came second, with a gap of over 21 VPs to Colin Clifford - Catherine Chaffey, then came Judy Osie - Witold Chylewski close behind. My partner and I played the eventual winners in round 2

and were duly beaten up. Mark's approach to bidding can be a bit idiosyncratic, but it works. Witness this hand:

Ordinary mortals open the South hand 1[°], expecting to make a jump rebid of 3§. Mark, however, chose to open 1§! Partner (Rakesh' partner that is) overcalled 1[©] and Les boldly bid 1^a. In the methods that Mark and Les use, this promised only a 4+ suit, not necessarily 5+ cards as would be the common interpretation. However, it seemed obvious to me that Les must have length in spades, so I thought I would try to stop our opponents finding the spade slam and jammed with 4[©]. Mark rebid 5"!! Les gave this some thought and reached the same conclusion as the rest of us viz. that Mark must have 2-0-5-6 shape with a very strong hand. So he bid 6§ ... and despite the fragility of the contract after Mark had to ruff the opening lead and then play four rounds of trumps to pick up the queen, he proceeded to make all 13 tricks via the spade finesse. Only 4 pairs bid to slam (two in 6§ and two in 6^a) but only Mark managed to make it, for +15 IMPs. I asked him later about his choice of opening bid later on. "Well", he said, "there are many ways to bid any strong hand." I suggested that his approach might amount to swimming against the tide. "So what's new?" said Mark "I have been doing that all my life!" And a very nice slam too. Maybe if I had read Bill Treble's book I would have bid it. Would you have bid it? Despite the tough competition, I have always enjoyed playing the Swan River Swiss Pairs event. No round is ever easy, the hands are always different, and you usually need to "extend" your partnership understandings – sometimes to breaking point! But that's the challenge of the event and one reason I enjoy it.

On occasions, you do get hands which you've seen before. While I haven't seen the exact hands, I remember playing 2 hands that I can remember reading "straight from the text book". I didn't recognise the first hand immediately, but I did recognise the 2nd one. I'll talk about these hands below.

This was the first hand of the event for Peter and myself – it certainly got both of us thinking hard really quickly! My hand was as follows:

- 🕈 AK5
- 🛡 AQ97
- T975
- **&** 32

It's a pretty good hand to start the event. It's even better when your partner opens 1H. I was immediately thinking of game and hoping we had more than that.

So the bidding started 1H - 2NT (modified Jacoby 2NT). When Peter bid 3D showing a non-minimum hand and an undisclosed singleton, the following thoughts immediately came to mind:

If his singleton is in diamonds, my hand becomes fantastic – declarer will be able to ruff three losing diamonds. Then slam looks a distinct possibility, even if declarer has the worst hand he has promised.

- If his singleton is in clubs, that's ok but declarer will probably still have to lose 1 club and some diamonds.
- If his singleton is in spades, that's not so good declarer can still discard a loser in declarer's hand but that's all, and declarer will probably still have to lose some diamonds.

Please, please, let his singleton be in diamonds!

In order to locate which suit Peter's singleton was in, I bid 3H. When his 3NT reply confirmed it was in diamonds, I was very happy indeed! So I bid 4S (showing a 1st or 2nd round spade control, denying a club or diamond control) and Peter was able to initiate a Keycard Blackwood conclusion to the auction.

In summary: 1H - 2NT - 3D - 3H - 3NT - 4S - 4NT - 5S - 6H.

The probable textbook bidding is as follows (using standard Jacoby 2NT):

1H – 2NT – 3D (shortage in diamonds) – 3S (control in spades) – 4NT – 5S – 6H

The lead was the Ace of Diamonds (I was expecting a diamond lead because of the auction).

Partner's hand is as follows:

- 🙅 QJ84
- KJ832
- 2
- 🗳 AK7

The play is straight forward – lose the first diamond, ruff the 2nd diamond, draw trumps (hope they don't split 4-0), then ruff the 7S in dummy for the 12th trick. Only 27 HCPs between us, but the slam is always there.

This hand is a textbook example of how not having values opposite shortage works magnificently:

- If you swap declarer's diamonds and spades, you can only make 11 and there is a possibility of a ruff (so maybe only making 10).
- If you swap declarer's diamonds and clubs, you will probably only get 11 tricks (losing 1 club and 1 diamond).

The second hand occurred in the last round with both of us feeling quite tired but eager to finish off with a win – it had not been a good day up until that point!

There was no opposition bidding, and the bidding went 1NT - 2C - 2H - 3NT. The Queen of Clubs was lead and the hands were as follows



On the surface, it looks reasonably straight forward – 2 club tricks, 2 diamond tricks, 3 hearts tricks (after losing the AH) and 2 spade tricks (after losing the AS). That's 9 tricks – what could possibly go wrong?

Unfortunately, plenty can go wrong if you aren't careful. You have to lose the lead twice – if the defence keep leading clubs, you can't stop a 3^{rd} round of clubs. But does that matter?

- If the clubs split 4-3, it doesn't matter at all. You will lose at most 2 club tricks plus the 2 aces no problem.
- If the clubs split 6-1 or 7-0, it doesn't matter as long as the hand with 0 or 1 clubs has at least one of the missing aces. If they do, they can't lead clubs when they get in – so you are safe. Having said that, a hand with 2 Aces and most of the clubs would probably have got involved in the bidding at some stage.
- If the clubs split 5-2, you have a problem to consider. If you win the first trick <u>and</u> the hand with 2 clubs wins with one of the aces, they will probably lead back a club. When you lose the 2nd ace, the hand with the long clubs may have that ace. They will then play their winning clubs (3 of them), so you are down 1.

What is the solution to the 5-2 club split problem:

- Pray that the aces are split between the hands and the hand which wins the 2nd Ace doesn't have 5 clubs. While prayer isn't banned at the bridge table, it's not the best way to play if you can avoid it! Is there another way?
- Don't win the first round of clubs hold up for one round. That means with a 5-2 split, the person with the short clubs cannot lead them again – then you are safe.

Here are the remaining 2 hands at the table

Opening Leader



As you can see, it was necessary to hold up for one round and win the 2nd club. I chose to play hearts first, so my prayers would not have been answered - it was really essential to hold up in clubs to make the contract once I had started playing hearts

At the table, I did remember reading about a situation like this on a web site (I think it was <u>http://</u> <u>aces.bridgeblogging.com/</u> - written by Bobby Wolff). And somehow I remember his solution to the problem. I was still relieved that the advice actually worked! So thank you Bobby for helping me make the contract.

Lotteries Grants Commission

Recently our Office Manager attended an information day at Lottery West and while she was there she saw these interesting historical artifacts. As you can see from the information below the Barrel has not been used for many a year, but I am sure many of the hopes or our parents, or maybe grandparents, failed to be drawn from within it years past.



This is the original barrel built for the Lotteries Commission in 1933 by coopers from the Swan Brewery. Numbers were manually drawn from the 100,000 numbered marbles inside this barrel to determine the winner and all minor prizes for each lottery draw.

The first draw was held at the Perth Town Hall on 21 March 1933 and offered a first prize of £1000. The winner was Miss Jean Smart of Cottesloe.

The barrel was last used in the late 1940s and has since been replace by a computer based random number generator, then by the current arrangement viewed on television.




