#### **Member Profile - Beverly Hunt**



Beverly was born in the UK and brought up in WA from the age of 3. Despite coming from a staunch Anglican family, she was educated at 'Our Lady's College' - now Mercedes College. At age 9, she won Junior Model of the Year' - the photo shows why. After Year 12, she joined the travel industry and became the first sales executive of the Sheraton Perth Hotel, then transferred to Melbourne to join the Southern Cross Hotel as Sales Manager. Headhunted by Pan American Airways, she moved to Sydney for the position of Business Development Manager and re-

ceived the Worldwide Sales Award in 1981.

Beverly returned to Perth in her 30s and broke through the glass ceiling to become the first female State Manager for American Express. This relationship lasted for 17 years. Noting that many of the people she employed had university degrees, Beverly decided it would be good to do the same. Working full time, she completed a Bachelor of Arts double degree majoring in Psychology and English. At this time she wrote the biography of her tennis playing sister - Lesley Hunt - which was credited towards her degree. On being offered a scholarship, Beverly completed a Graduate Diploma in Education - retiring from the workforce at 55 to complete this. Then followed eight wonderful years at Christchurch Grammar School, mainly part time.

Beverly did try marriage - a couple of times - but unfortunately found it wanting. She considers the time not entirely wasted as in marriage one she won first prize for the Best Orange Marmalade at the local show; and in marriage two - the best cake for Telethon (Spiced Persimmon). # Goran and Maugham - what could they have in common?

One of our intrepid librarians, Ali Rigg, brought to my attention Charles Goran's 1946 book 'The Standard Book of Bidding'. The introduction was written by W. Somerset Maugham.

"I am not at all the proper person to write an introduction to this book for I am an indifferent bridge player and my chief asset as a partner is that I have never thought myself anything else. I do not engage in post-mortems, for I think the players that habitually do so make a bore of the most entertaining game that the art of man has devised: the fact is that if you cannot see a mistake when you have made it, no argument will convince you of your error so the carping critic might just as well hold his peace and deal with the next hand. When my partner blames me for having played the wrong card, I accept his re-proof with humility - and when he has let me down 1,400 by grossly over-calling, I bid him cheerfully not to give it another thought". Wise words WSM for us today. Classic!!

### Blast from the past...Paul Marston 'Language of Bidding' 2009

A re-read of Chapter 1 - opening bids - provides some timely reminders;

- Playing in a major is always preferable; spades is the boss suit
- Open weak under certain circumstances; the Rule of 20 is helpful
- There are three other important considerations togetherness of honours is important; honours work better in long suits, not short suits; intermediates 9s and 10s are important long suits with 2s and 3s should be down valued. As mentioned above, be more inclined to open with spades as this forces the opps to the two level
- The decision about which suit to open in is more about length than strength
- With five of a major and six of a minor normally preference the major
- If you open light in the 3<sup>rd</sup> seat, it is on the understanding that you are free to pass any response
- Avoid opening light in the 3<sup>rd</sup> seat with a singleton partner may likely bid this suit

#### Your rights as Dummy

#### Dummy can;

- Inquire of declarer if they fail to follow suit e.g. no hearts partner?
- Indicate a lead direction if declarer looks like they may be incorrect -NOT after declarer plays the card.
- Correct the placement of a card for trick count only declarer and before next trick is played - NOT after

#### **Dummy cannot**;

- Touch cards or move hands towards cards, even if it appears 'obvious' what declarer might play
- Communicate with the opposition
- Bring to the attention of anybody, a rule infraction during play e.g. a revoke. They may raise the issue at the end of play. Declarer will call the TD. Dummy provides information if requested.

Another dummy rule - nobody is permitted to 'spit it' at the table!!
